OBITUARY.

Taylor. A MEMOTE.

A little more than a half century A little more than a half century ago, two voung men, standing at the threshold of long, useful and happy lives, on the same day cast in their lots with the people called Methodists at the old Monticello church, Jeffer son county, Fla. One of these still lingers among us, honored for the in tegrity of his sharacter and the uprightness of his walk; the other, Dr. B. W. Taylor, has gone to join the majority on the "other side of the river."

river."
Dr. Taylor was bern in Mecklen burg county, Virginia, in the year 18-5; came to Florida, a young physician, and settled at Tallahassee, in 834; removed to Monticello in 1836, and here lived to the date of his decease, Sept. 13, 1891.

He was twice happily married—the first time to Mrs. Elizabeth Turpin (nee Simkins) in 1837, the second time to Mrs. Maria Bailey in 1872—no issue by the first marriage, two children by the second both of whom survive.

But for the fact that his was more than a negative character and its pos-itive side needs also to be emphasized, this memoir might be very fittingly summed up and closed in the remarsummed up and closed in the remarkable statement, that he lived fifty-tive years at the same place without a single reproach. His success as a medical practitioner was perbaps largely attributable to two. facts: He was faithful to his patients and he was a man of prayer. When he undertook a case, his best thought and closest at tention, whatever these might cost him in self-sacrifice, were at once pledged. His remedies were accompanied with prayer; and, when hu man restoratives seemed entirely inefman restoratives seemed entirely inef-fectual or could no longer be adminis tered, he still had recourse to prayer, no winder that such a man won and held the confidence and esteem of all with whom he came in professional or social sontact.

In 1851, by the death of Mrs. Emala Bellamy, a relative of his first wife, he was left in charge of four orphan girls to be reared, educated and equipped for life. He was equal to the occasion and true to his trust; and these tender wards—three of them are now grand-mothers and all still living—rise up to day and call him blessed. His wise care and truly parental consideration inspired in them a deeply tender and abiding love, beautiful indeed to wit-ness. In these days superior educa ness. In these cays superior educa-tional facilities had not, a mow, been brought within the reach of all the people, and the hours now required to reach Macon in a palace coach were perhaps then lengthened out in to as meny days in an arduous over land trip by carriage. But when the Wesleyen school term opened in the fall this faithful guardian was there fall this faithful guardian was there with his girls, and when the scholas to year was ended he was there again to see them safely home. And these trips, by the way, constituted his only vacations from professional work during his lon and busy life.

As a Christian, Dr. Faylor was a man of deep and rich experience, a liberal supporter of the Church and

liberal supporter of the Church and its institutions, undemonstrative in his professions, but ardent and active in his love and always glad when it in his love and always glad when it was said "Let us go into the house of the Lord." His later pastors, after he had become so newhat hard of hearing, will not forget that eager, hungry expression of his countenacce while listening to the Word, and his appropriate node when he get when he approving nods when he got what he wanted. His presence was a bene diction, his "nod" an inspiration to this preacher. Oh, how much we do

miss him!

Besides a competency of this world's goods, accumulated by his own honest efforts, he leaves to his sorrowing children the heritage of a good name, and to us all a life fragrant of good dreds done in the name of Jesus. No last words were spoken—none were needed; for his affairs for both worlds were kept always in order. His de-parture was sudden and painless A stroke of paralysis brought his friends and loved ones to his side, and then breathed his life out sweetly, and en-tered upon his reward.
