PREFACE

The aim of the INDEXED BIBLE is to make the Bible its own instead of opinions. It will be noted at once that this systematic thorough analytical method of Bible study, arranged so as to embody the "labor saving" idea, which has within the last fifty years become a unique plan used for indexing, condensing and classifying the names, places and subjects mentioned in the Bible in few words, is a rich, important discovery and the great teaching of the age. Years of time and labor have been consumed in bringing this plan to light, so that busy people can consult the Bible quickly regarding subjects bearing upon life and its responsibilities, thus finding time for practice for the various necessities of life. The compilers have not burdened it with unnecessary matter or undue citations, but have made the best collection in each class.

PART I.

This section opens with a brief but adequate and scholarly history of the Bible, establishing the fact that our Bible is the best. This includes what follows on the "History of the Bible" for a period of 500 years, and brings the Bible down to the present. The next feature is the "History of the Books of the Bible," which is designed to be of the greatest benefit to the reader regarding especially the contents and structure of each book.

Then follows the Bible Index in which is condensed a great amount of the teachings of the Bible are set forth in a manner to meet the needs of busy people and the student, thus laying a foundation for the study of the Scriptures, and giving the references in the Old and New Testaments can be quickly verified and the Bible becomes its own interlocking encyclopædia, dictionary, concordance, reference Bible. This includes the Scriptural Text as given in the Authorized Version, using all modern diacritical marks, so as to produce one uniform text in all Bibles published. PART III.

The division of each subject is determined by the subjects which are thus brought forward and under their various pages of the Bible are assembled without coloring or interpretation. This feature is enhanced by the use of the three versions, the Authorized Version of 1885 and the American Revision of 1901.
