MASTER WHITMAN CARPENTER DIED IN COLUMBUS, GA.

### WAS MANLY LITTLE GENTLEMAN.

Went to Visit His Grandmother
Three Weeks Ago, And no One
Knew he Was Sick

Whitman Carpenter is dead! This is the sad and startling news that was flashed to Tallahassee yesterday afternoon, and it filled with sorrow the hearts of Whitman's parents, as well as the scores of friends possessed by the boy.

About three weeks ago Whitman went to Columbus, Ga., to visit his grandmother, and no one here, not even his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Carpenter knew that he was sick. The first intimation they had of the awful truth came in a teiegram about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, stating that he was seriously ill, and that a letter had been written giving particulars.

Owing to the many washouts along the railroads caused by the recent storm, the letter has not yet been received. Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter were very much worried over the news, but nothing could be done. No trains were running, and it was impossible for them to go to their boy. A short time after the receipt of this telegram, the loving parents were grieved and shocked beyond measure, by the receipt of another announcing the death of their son.

Whitman Carpenter was nearly 15 years old. He was one of the brightest and most manly young fellows in Tallahassee. Polite and courteous to everybody, he possessed all the attributes of a perfect little gentleman, and gave promise of a useful career. Few boys of his years were more industrious or labored more faithfully at any undertaking than Whitman. His straightforward, manly nature won him the friendship of all with whom he came in contact, and he will be missed by his young friends and school mates alike. His works are the
